The Argentine poet and writer Jorge Luis Borges writes in his poem "The Library":

I have always imagined that Paradise will be a kind of library. Every book in that place, I believe,

"Libraries have gone through their own transformation in the digital age — it's not just

books anymore... [But] just seeing a library is enough to inspire me, whether it is one of the

creative *Little Free Libraries* or the *Library of Congress*. Libraries have always been

magical places that make me want to be better and know more, and I feel so lucky to be a

part of one. But you are a part of one, too, even if you didn't know it! This library belongs

to all of us!"

Adds Andrew Carnegie: "A library outranks any other one thing a community can do to benefit

its people. It is a never failing spring in a desert." According to Wikipedia between 1883 and

1929 Carnegie built a total of 2,509 libraries! That's a lot of springs! We do not have a Carnegie Library. We are blessed with a Caroline Weeks Public Library whose

philosophy in her philanthropy surely mirrors that of Borges and Carnegie. A library can be a

kind of paradise and is a kind of never failing spring. And we are benefactors of her beneficence:

Weeks Public Library belongs to all of us...and we to it.
